



GABRIELLE'S ANGEL FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES AWARDS TOTALING \$2.1 MILLION

Scientists Receive Critical Funding for Research Investigating Blood Cancers

NEW YORK (March 30, 2017) – Gabrielle's Angel Foundation for Cancer Research, one of the largest sources of non-governmental funding for cancer research in the nation, announces new grants totaling \$2.1 million. These awards will fund cutting-edge scientific researchers whose bold ideas will explore methods of prevention, detection and treatment of blood cancers.

Grant recipients were selected after a rigorous peer review by the Foundation's distinguished Medical Advisory Board, helmed by Stephen D. Nimer, MD, director of the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center in Miami, Florida. Seven junior investigators from the nation's leading research institutions have been awarded three-year grants of \$225,000. Dr. Arun Wiita of UCSF was awarded the prestigious Janet D. Rowley Medical Research Award in memory of renowned cancer research pioneer, Dr. Janet D. Rowley of the University of Chicago who served as a member of the Foundation's Medical Advisory Board from 1998 until her death in 2013. The Foundation also announced support for eight one-year grants; the Director's Innovation Fund at the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center in Miami, FL; one ASBMT New Investigator Award to Hanna Knaus, MD of Johns Hopkins University; three music therapy programs; and assorted symposia and medical conferences.

Gabrielle's Angel Foundation remains committed to funding the highest caliber young investigators at an early stage in their careers, providing support that allows them to explore their most creative ideas at a time when conventional funding sources are increasingly more difficult to obtain.

"We have fostered an entire generation of cancer researchers and fueled their scientific breakthroughs," said Dr. Nimer. "The future of cancer research has never been brighter and we are helping lead the way."
